


Patti Edwards





Weeks later when I got it out and started preparing, the more I looked at the ocean, the more belligerent I got about working it (You can't teach an old dog a new trick I guess...) This didn't LOOK like an ocean; an ocean flows; it isn't squares. It also bothered me that the ocean gets darker as it gets deeper. I remembered a picture I had seen years before; a scrappy quilt version, blue and white, of a Stars at Sea pattern. I was remembering how it really seemed to move when you looked at it; like an ocean would. So I thought, "I can take the white pieces and turn them blue and, moving down the quilt, grade them darker and it should seem like the ocean is getting deeper..." Now I was excited about making an ocean. This was a rather complicated block and I was glad this was not a queen size bed quilt!

So, I completely failed trying to work on someone else's pattern. Woof... The problems now are; I enjoy simply looking at it on my design wall. And my husband and mother both say it's too pretty to put the animals on. But I am determined to work on it this year. Appliqué, here I come!







