This is to be a throw. The pattern name is *Hugs and Kisses*; and is from designer, Basic Grey.






Barbara Genier — Guest

This was created for my 50th Wedding Anniversary, it took me seven years to complete. I first made circles out of construction paper, folding each 4 times to make 8 wedges. In one wedge I had each family member put their name in bubble letters, they choose the color of each letter. That wedge is then mirrored to the remaining 7 wedges of the circle. The created full circle pattern was then turned onto fabric with each circle being appliquéd to it's own square. I hand quilted the quilt. Because we celebrated our Anniversary by the ocean, I decided to use seashell and wave theme of fabric.

It's based on and inspired by the Frank Lloyd Wright stain-glass window in the Charles Ennis house he designed in Los Angeles, CA—1924-1926. She worked with the FLW Foundation to get permission to tweak his design so that it would lend itself to quilting. There are several patterns she designed based on his window designs. It was pieced and stitched by myself, finished in June 2025.
